Start from The Beginning


Geopolitics is the study of how a country's geography (location, terrain, land size, climate, soil and raw materials) affect its foreign, economic, military policy and strategy.



Map Uses:

"The most eye-catching distinction between this and typical western maps is that the map is <u>centred on the pacific ocean instead of western Europe.</u>"

Please give me a break We must spring clean our cob-web minds and relearn as suggested in the above comments. I invite all of you to write down the major differences and how the respective maps have altered your perceptions and understanding.

Let me help you in your analysis.

Some initial pointers:

Atlantic Centric Map

Pacific Centric Map

- Why naval power is so important in the 19th and 20th centuries but not anymore?
- Why our region was referred to as the "Dutch East Indies" and controlled by the "Dutch East India Company" which the British "inherited" the region from the Dutch, as the "British East Indies" and controlled by the "British East India Company"?

A Historical Analysis By The Brits

"The first known map of the "world," now located at the <u>British Museum</u>, is a <u>cuneiform</u> clay tablet from <u>Mesopotamia</u>, dated to between the late 8th and 6th centuries BCE. It is known as the <u>Babylonian Map of the World</u>. This map has two concentric circles, with the outer circle labelled "Bitter River" and the inner circle containing a representation of the city of <u>Babylon</u> bisected by the <u>Euphrates River</u>. This tablet is considered the first documented attempt by humans to graphically define the space in which they were living. <u>By equating Babylon with the world, the map also served as a symbol of Babylonian power.</u>"

"World maps through the ages have followed the pattern first laid by this Babylonian tablet: <u>They have represented the mapmaker's worldview</u>, which necessarily expresses the cultural and political biases that are embedded in those views. <u>As mapmakers' perception and understanding of the world have changed, so have world maps.</u>"

"Challenge confronted in early world maps was that of perspective: From what viewpoint does the mapmaker make the map? Early maps are—as Jerry Brotton, in A History of the World in 12 Maps (2012), has called them — "egocentric." The focus is on the mapmaker and their immediate environs, which are typically placed, as in the Babylonian tablet, at the map's center."

"During the <u>Renaissance</u>, some cartographers compared those who used a map to theatre-goers, as seen in the atlas Theatrum orbis terrarum ("Theatre of the World"), published in 1570 by <u>Abraham Ortelius</u>. Today, the technology that most often provides data for maps—and the maps themselves — <u>also sets expectations for a map's perspective</u>. We see the world from the perspective of a <u>satellite</u> orbiting Earth, in which we can zoom in to provide a high level of detail and zoom out to provide a much wider view. Sometimes, though, cultural convention determines perspective."

"Modern-day world maps show north as the "up" direction, even though there is nothing intrinsic to any of the four cardinal directions that warrants picking one direction rather the others." (Source for the above quotations - Britannica)

The World Maps provide a macro perspective. To appreciate the current "hotspots" you need to zero in on the "Micro-Maps" and the surrounding areas. I invite you to put on your Thinking Caps <u>for a moment</u> and consider <u>some</u> issues:
