Case Studies

General Milley

Many Republicans accused General Milley, the former Chairman of the US Joint Chiefs of Staff, of treason and called for his resignation, firing, and to be prosecuted in a court-martial. Recently, President Trump removed his national security clearance, privileges and security detail. General Milley was a member of an Inner Circle of coup plotters, even when it was President Trump who appointed General Milley to the prestigious post.

It was also revealed that General Milley held informal discussions with his deputies telling associates: "They may try, but they're not going to fucking succeed. You can't do this without the military. You can't do this without the <u>CIA</u>

and the <u>FBI</u>. We're the guys with the guns". He plotted against President Trump.

Regardless of your personal views, the below disclosures are unprecedented:-

<u>Senate Intelligence Committee</u> ranking member <u>Marco Rubio</u> called on Biden to fire Milley, stating that Milley had undermined "the sitting commander in chief" and "contemplated a treasonous leak of classified information to the <u>Chinese Communist Party</u> in advance of a potential armed conflict with the <u>People's Republic of China</u>". Many Republicans accused Milley of treason and called for his resignation, firing, or <u>court-martial</u>. Twenty-seven House Republicans, all members of the <u>Freedom Caucus</u>, wrote to <u>Secretary of Defense Lloyd Austin</u> demanding an Army Regulation 15-6 investigation into Milley's actions and for Milley's security clearance to be suspended.

Hours after Trump was inaugurated as the <u>47th President of the United States</u> on January 20, 2025, Milley's official portrait was removed from a <u>Pentagon</u> corridor where the portraits of all former chairmen are displayed. The next day workers patched the holes and painted the wall. A U.S. official told the New York Times that the White House had ordered the removal. On January 29, Defense Secretary <u>Pete Hegseth</u> suspended Milley's security clearance, withdrew the authorization for his security detail, and ordered a review of his actions as Chair of the Joint Chiefs of Staff with a view to demote him in rank.

"Milley allegedly placed military hands – his hands – on controls that belong exclusively to the president," Sen. Chuck Grassley, an Iowa Republican, said during a 2022 Senate floor speech in response to the revelations in "Peril." Milley's "brazen words and actions strike at the heart of our democracy – civilian control of the military – and show utter contempt for the commander in chief," Grassley said.

By an Executive Order, President Trump did the same for President Biden for his crimes and plots.

The Russian Dossier Hoax

John Ratcliffe, current director of CIA:

But the 51 former "intelligence" officials who cast doubt on <u>The Post's Hunter Biden laptop</u> stories in a public letter really were just desperate to get Joe Biden elected president. Given the context of what the Russians were doing at the time (and continue to do — Ukraine being just the latest example), I considered the cautionary warning to be prudent."
